The Lighting of the Lantern

Antiphon

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.


Presider You, O Lord, are my lamp:*People* My God, you make my darkness bright.

Let us pray.

Almighty God, you have poured upon us the new light of your incarnate Word: Grant that this light, enkindled in our hearts, may shine forth in our lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The lantern is lit in memory of the first service ever held at St. James's Mission on the evening of Christmas Day 1864. "It was a typical Christmas Day. The weather was fine and cold, the sleighing good, and the skies were brilliant with the stars," writes the Rev. Edward Abbott. The leaders arrived at Atwill's Hall which was where the community gathered at that time and they found that the pulpit and lectern had not been delivered. And so they sent two young men on a sleigh to race to Boston to get those pieces of furniture. The furniture was installed in time but then the gas stopped and there was no light or heat. So, they turned on a stove for heat and lay leaders went racing to their homes to find other sources of lighting. They returned and their "kerosene lamps shone brightly" at that first service of St. James's Episcopal Church.

Night-time flies– baby's eyes greet the dawning day; rising sun, dark undone– life is on the way. (*Repeat refrain*) Hymn: The first Nowell




